Hysteroscopy Dilation and Curettage (D&C) Fact Sheet

Technique

The procedure involves two steps:

- 1. The inside of the uterus is viewed using a hysteroscope. A hysteroscope is a telescope that is specially designed for viewing the inside of the uterus. Any abnormalities such as polyps or uterine fibroids will be identified.
- 2. These abnormalities and the endometrium (lining of the uterus) are removed.

Incisions

No incisions are required for this procedure.

Operative Time

- Operative times vary greatly depending on the findings at the time of surgery. Your surgeon will proceed with safety as his/her priority.
- Average times range from 15-30 minutes.

Anesthesia

- Conscious sedation
- General anesthesia

Preoperative Care

- Schedule your case to happen immediately after your period.
- Please do not eat anything by mouth after midnight

Hospital Stay

- Office procedure
- Day surgery

Postoperative Care

- These guidelines are intended to give you a general idea of your postoperative course. Since every patient is unique and has a unique procedure, your recovery may differ.
- Anti-inflammatory pain medicine such as ibuprofen or naproxen is usually required for the first several days. Most patients do not need opioid pain medications.
- Driving is allowed once the anesthesia has worn off. A care partner must be present to drive you home from the hospital.
- If they desire, patients may return to work on the day after the procedure.
- You may experience a mild vaginal bleeding for several days after the procedure. If it is not
 associated with increasing pain or fever, it is nothing to worry about and will resolve.

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
